The New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services (DVS) will commemorate Veterans Day with a ceremony at the DVS-managed Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Angel Fire on Saturday, November 11 at 11a.m.

Acting Cabinet Secretary Jamison A. Herrera is scheduled to deliver a Veterans Day address, followed by the keynote address by past-national American Gold Star Mothers, Inc. President Becky Christmas. This year's winner of the Ferrell Udell Veterans' Service Award will be presented by Vietnam Veterans of America/Northern New Mexico Chapter 996.

Musical presentations before (10:45a.m.) and after the ceremony will be provided by the award-winning Cimarron High School Concert Band.

The public is invited to come to honor and celebrate all men and women who have served our country as members of the United States military.

World War II Veteran Receives His Replacement Service Medals

Acting DVS Cabinet Secretary Jamison A. Herrera presented eight replacement WWII service medals to 97-year-old Army veteran Ascension J. Martinez at a presentation ceremony on October 27 in Martinez's hometown of Chimayo.

Martinez had lost track of the medals--one of which was a Bronze Star--and told his family he'd really like to see them again "before I go." (the family says

he's in good health).

Secretary Herrera, who is the deputy adjutant general of the New Mexico National Guard, was emotional when he presented the medals of front of Martinez's family and friends who had gathered at the famed Rancho de Chimayo restaurant for the ceremony.

"They're small tokens. They're trinkets. But they represent so much more...of the sacrifice, of what he chose to do," said the secretary. "His service represents the best of America...the best of New Mexico. I'm proud to be here to be able to do this for him.

Martinez served in the Pacific theater of the war—helping with the liberation of the Philippines, and in Japan immediately after its surrender in September of 1945.

The secretary thanked Martinez for paving the way for future generations of service members—including his own Army service.

"None of us would be here, without standing on the shoulders of giants...like Mr. Martinez," said Secretary Herrera. "This is very near and dear to my heart."

Martinez was then presented with a WWII Veteran baseball cap—something he had mentioned to his family that he always wanted...but never got around to getting one. DVS has produced [a short video](#) highlighting the medal presentation.



DVS Completes 1st Restoration Phase of Historic Cemetery

Phase one of the DVS cleanup of the Albuquerque Historic Fairview Cemetery is now complete, and phase two is now underway.

DVS received funding from Bernalillo County to provide oversight of a cleanup of the veterans' sections and gravesites at the now-closed cemetery, which opened in 1881 and is Albuquerque's oldest cemetery. More than 12,000 are buried at the site—

550 of whom are veterans, including some who served as far back as our nation's Civil War.

In the completed first phase of the cleanup, the first veterans' section was cleared of debris, graded, and leveled. All headstones in this section were removed, cleaned, raised, and realigned to National and State Veterans Cemetery standards. Headstones that were broken were reordered and replaced. The monument to unknown service members was also restored.

Phase two involves cleaning another area of veterans' gravesites and will include the installation of a 30-foot lighted flagpole. Roads in and around the veterans' areas will be graded and redefined.



Under the agreement with Bernalillo County, DVS will oversee the restoration of the veterans' sections. Restoration of the remainder of the cemetery is to be continued by the Fairview Historical Foundation.



The foundation holds a cleanup on the first Saturday of each month (next date: December 2). Volunteers are encouraged to bring rakes, shovels, gloves, hats, sunglasses or protective eyewear, and water...and join in this all-volunteer effort to restore the cemetery. VBOC Presents the 2023 New Mexico Veterans Business Summit

The New Mexico Veterans Business Outreach Center (VBOC) presented the 2023 New Mexico Veterans Business Summit on October 31–November 1 in Las Cruces at the New Mexico State University Corbett Center.

The VBOC is the veterans' business development division of DVS, tasked with helping entrepreneurially minded veterans, transitioning active-duty service members, and their spouses with creating and expanding a small business.



At the free two-day conference, VBOC Director Johnny Martinez was joined by staff from other federal, state, and local small business advocates to present information about the many services, programs, and grants available in New Mexico to help not only New Mexico's entrepreneurs—but specifically, veterans and spouses...including women and service-connected disabled veterans.

VBOC Director Johnny Martinez (*top photo/center, on stage*) said veterans are well-suited to successfully operating a business once their military service is finished.

“Veterans have a set of skills that are lost among many in today’s society,” said Martinez, who is an Army veteran. “We know how to lead. We know how to listen. We know how to take action. These are all skills needed to succeed in operating your own business.”



Other organizations that presented information were the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA), SBDC, APEX Accelerator, SCORE, WESST, Arrowhead Center, and the NM MBDA. State agencies/departments that also presented information were: Economic Development, Workforce Solutions, General Services, Taxation & Revenue, Regulation & Licensing, and the Secretary of State office.

SBA New Mexico District Office Director John Garcia, an Army Vietnam War veteran, said the presenting agencies said veterans have earned these benefits through their military service. He explained why the presenting partner agencies are committed to helping veterans become successful in their post-military lives.

“We’re dream-makers. Our job is to help make veteran entrepreneurs make their dreams come true,” said Garcia. “If we can help a veteran become financially successful, then there’s a better chance that everything else will take care of itself.”



The New Mexico Veteran's Business Outreach Center (VBOC) assists entrepreneurial-minded veterans, transitioning active service members, National Guard & Reserve members, and their spouses with starting or growing a small business.

It was the first state-supported program created in the nation when the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) began offering grants in 2010 for successful agency applicants to help veteran-owned businesses. The VBOC can help with everything from business planning, start-up and expansion funding, marketing, landing federal contracts, and anything else a small business needs to launch and grow.

In addition to providing free private one-on-one business counseling, the VBOC conducts numerous *Boots to Business* small-business development workshops throughout the year at New Mexico's military bases for the benefit of transitioning active-duty service members.

The VBOC is based in the DVS Albuquerque office, in the Pinetree Business Center at 4801 Indian School Road—just off Interstate 40 and the San Mateo Boulevard exit. All services are free, but an appointment is required, and can easily be done by contacting anyone on the VBOC team:

No appointment is necessary. Veterans or dependents will be assisted on a first-come, first-served basis.



DVS Takes Part in Veterans' Town Hall Meeting in Albuquerque

DVS Acting Cabinet Secretary Jamison Herrera (*left/photo/2nd from right*) was a panelist at a Military & Veterans' Town Hall Meeting hosted by State Rep. Meredith Dixon on October 16 in Albuquerque at the Manzano Mesa Multigenerational Center.

Secretary Herrera was joined by retired USAF Brig. Gen. Hanson Scott, Sherman McCorkle, and Paul

Cassidy, who are board members of the Kirtland AFB Partnership Committee; and Brock Wolff, CEO of the New Mexico Veterans Integration Center.

Rep. Dixon invited the panelists to talk about their organizations and their goals, and answer questions from the audience. Secretary Herrera emphasized the need for veterans to file for all benefits they're entitled to--and to keep up and update them as you get older.

"Please, take to heart. You've earned these benefits. For all you Vietnam and Korean War who think, 'If I get them, then someone else wont.' No--there's plenty for everybody," said the secretary. "Don't cheat your family out of the benefits they helped you earn. They deserve these, too."



He also strongly urged veterans to contact DVS veterans' service officers to when filing for these benefits—which he said, from personal experience, can be a cumbersome experience.

"It's tough—especially if you go it alone. It can be frustrating to get a denial letter when you felt that you gave everything that you possibly could have given," said the secretary. "We have people that are trained to get the highest possible rating that you're eligible for. This is our mission, so please give us a call. We will help you."

DVS State Benefits Division Director Edward Mendez (*above photo/at right*) also attended the town hall meeting and answered questions about state veterans' benefits.

The Bernalillo County Commission has approved a recommendation by the county Arts Board to relocate a piece of art honoring local Vietnam War hero Richard Rocco to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Angel Fire.

The memorial bust was dedicated in 2008 at the city's West Side Community Center to honor U.S. Army Chief Warrant Officer Richard Rocco. The South Valley native was awarded the Medal of Honor--our nation's highest combat award--for saving the lives of three fellow soldiers who were with him on a helicopter that was shot down in 1970 during the Vietnam War. He had volunteered for this mission to evacuate South Vietnamese soldiers wounded in a heavy combat zone.

Despite suffering a broken wrist, hip, severe burns, and suffering from excruciating pain, Rocco made three separate trips, under heavy fire, to safely evacuate the three unconscious medical team members. He then passed out himself and was airlifted to safety and treatment.

On December 12, 1974, President Gerald Ford formally presented Rocco with the Medal of Honor during a ceremony at the White House. The co-pilot of the shot-down helicopter, Lt. Lee Caubareaux, had vigorously lobbied for Rocco to receive the award.

After leaving the military in 1978, Rocco returned to Albuquerque and became an advocate for veterans and their families. He served as commissioner of the New Mexico Veterans Commission, which was the precursor to DVS. Rocco was also instrumental in founding the New Mexico Chapter of the Vietnam Veterans of America, the state veterans home in Truth or Consequences, and helping create peer counseling programs for fellow Vietnam War veterans.

Rocco returned to active duty in 1991 during the Gulf War and was stationed at Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio, Texas, where he trained medical personnel. He and his wife Maria then lived in Mexico and San Antonio, TX, before he passed away in 2002 from cancer.

"Chief Warrant Officer Rocco exhibited tremendous courage and bravery in battle, and a tremendous desire after his service to help his fellow Vietnam veterans," said DVS Acting Cabinet Secretary Jamison A. Herrera. "DVS is extremely privileged to be the new home for this artwork that honors one of New Mexico's truly great heroes."

DVS, which manages the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, is planning a dedication ceremony and will announce details once they have been finalized.

Recap of the 2023 Honor Flight of Southern New Mexico/El Paso


Mission 16 of the Honor Flight of Southern New Mexico and El Paso, TX, returned to the El Paso International Airport on September 30.

The flight of 34 veterans—three from the Korean War, and 31 Vietnam War veterans--departed on September 28 for the annual whirlwind two-day visit to Washington, D.C. for the veterans and their chaperones to visit the national war memorials honoring their war eras.

As part of the visit to the Vietnam Memorial, a “Welcome Home” ceremony is held on a hill overlooking the memorial—to provide the welcome that many Vietnam Veterans did not get upon returning home from their service during the war.

“The visit was a cathartic experience for them,” said Honor Flight Team Leader Elaine Pickett. “I heard them say things like ‘This trip did for me in three days what 5 years of counseling couldn’t do’... ‘I feel like I’m part of the American society again’...and ‘It took over 50 years for some one to give me a hug and tell me welcome home.’

The group also visited the Arlington National Cemetery in nearby Alexandria, VA. Honor flights are free, and are courtesy of the national Honor Flight program. A similar honor flight for northern New Mexico veterans made the journey earlier this spring.

The annual flight also provides closure, healing--and the welcome home that many Vietnam War veterans never got when they returned from their service in the 1960s and 70s.



During a visit to the Korean War Veterans Memorial, a group of tourists from South Korea—including a couple of South Korean veterans of that war--were elated to find an American Korean War veteran—U.S. Marine Martín Luna of El Paso. The group begged Pickett to take a picture of them with Luna.

“I was overwhelmed with emotion when I saw the Korean tourists rush with excitement towards Mr. Luna,” said Pickett. “They gathered around him in admiration and treated him the way a great American hero should be treated. It is astounding to me how the Korean people, young and old, freely and openly embrace and recognize the importance of the American veterans.”

News from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA)

VA Sets Record for Care/Benefits Delivered

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) announced it delivered more care and more benefits to more Veterans than ever before in its recently completed fiscal year 2023 (Oct. 1, 2022 – Sep. 30, 2023). Some of the key findings released by VA:

Providing more world-class health care to veterans: VA delivered more than 116 million health care appointments to veterans, surpassing the previous all-time record by more than 3 million appointments.

Delivering more earned benefits to veterans and survivors: VA delivered \$163 billion in earned benefits, including \$150 billion in compensation and pension benefits, to 1,535,685 veterans and survivors – **all of which are all-time records**. VA also processed 1,981,854 veteran and survivor claims, surpassing the previous all-time record by 15.9%.

Encouraging more veterans to apply for earned benefits: Thanks to the largest outreach campaign in VA history, veterans submitted 2,433,729 claims applications – an all-time record and 39% more than in 2022. Veterans also submitted 2,299,815 intents-to-file – an all-time record and 62% more than in 2022.

Supporting more veteran caregivers: VA provided services, resources, and assistance to a record 74,270 veteran family caregivers – supporting them while they take care of the veterans they love.

Supporting more veterans in crisis: The Veterans Crisis Line received 1,002,971 million calls, texts, and chat – surpassing the previous all-time record by 15.1%. VA also provided no-cost emergency health care to 33,542 Veterans in acute suicidal crises through a new program launched in January.

Providing more dental care to veterans: VA dental clinics provided 5.5 million procedures to more than 560,000 patients, surpassing the previous all-time record by 4.8%.

Providing more life insurance coverage for veterans: VA provided an all-time record \$1.5 trillion in [life insurance coverage](#) to 5.6 million policyholders. This includes new coverage awarded through [VA life](#), a new program that extended life insurance access to millions of veterans.

Screening more veterans for toxic exposures: VA screened an all-time record 4,599,009 veterans for toxic exposures, a critical step to catching and treating potentially life-threatening health conditions as early as possible.

Providing more resting places to our nation's heroes: A record 5.4 million people — including 4.1 million Veterans — are now buried in VA national cemeteries.

Processing more veteran appeals: The Board of Veterans' Appeals processed 103,245 Veteran appeals, an all-time record and 8.3% increase over 2022.

Many of these accomplishments for veterans have been made possible by the PACT Act – the largest expansion of VA health care and benefits in generations — which President Biden signed into law in August 2022. In fiscal year 2023, VA's Veterans Health Administration and Veterans Benefits Administration both grew at the fastest rates in 15 years. VHA now has more than 400,000 employees for the first time in history, and VBA now has more than 32,000 employees for the first time in history.



VA Reduces Premium Rates for its Veterans' Mortgage Life Insurance

VA has reduced premiums for most veterans and service members insured under the [Veterans' Mortgage Life Insurance program](#).

Through the VMLI program, [eligible](#) veterans and service members with severe disabilities can purchase up to \$200,000 in mortgage life insurance. This coverage means that if a policyholder passes away, the amount of their coverage will be used to pay down their mortgage — helping to ensure that their loved ones won't be responsible for that cost.

Starting Oct. 1, most VMLI policyholders saw a reduction between 6% and 36% of their premiums, depending on their age. Veterans will see the reduced rates on their next billing cycle, starting in November, as payment of each VMLI premium is for the prior month.

“This coverage will now be more affordable for many of our nation's heroes, making it easier for them to protect their homes — and their loved ones — even if they pass away,” said VA Under Secretary for Benefits Joshua Jacobs. “This is a great step forward that will mean peace of mind for many of the veterans we serve.”

While a small group of VMLI policyholders will not see a decrease in premiums under the new actuarial table, VA locked in their current premiums so they will not increase.



DVS Field Offices in New Mexico
