#### September is Suicide Prevention Awareness Month

Everyday, we work to raise awareness about suicide prevention and renew our commitment to supporting those who have served our nation. The New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services (NMDVS) recognizes that Veterans and their families have given so much in service to our country. Yet, too many continue to face invisible wounds such as PTSD, depression, and the challenges of transitioning back to civilian life. Suicide Prevention Month is a reminder that no veteran should face these struggles alone.



Across the United States, suicide remains a leading cause of death, and the risk is even higher among veterans. Behind every identification number and rank is a name, a face, and a story of service and sacrifice. Together, we can help ensure that every veteran knows support is within their reach.

#### **Local Resources for Veterans in New Mexico**

The New Mexico 988 Crisis and Access Line (NMCAL) is available 24/7/365 to provide free, confidential support for anyone in distress, including Veterans and their families. Veterans can call or text 988 and press "1" to be connected directly with the Veterans Crisis Line, where responders understand military culture and the unique challenges faced by those who have served. **Peer to Peer Warmline** – A safe, confidential line where individuals can connect with trained Peer Support Specialists who have military experience and can offer empathy, understanding, and guidance. Available daily from 3:30 PM to 11:30 PM at 1-855-4NM-7100 (1-855-466-7100).

**NMConnect App** – A free, confidential mobile app that connects veterans and their families to 988, the Warmline, and local and national resources. It also includes self-help tools and wellness tracking to support resilience. <u>Download for iOS & Android</u>.

New Mexico 5 Actions Program™ – A free, confidential online tool that helps individuals, families, and communities address substance use and addiction, issues that too often go hand in hand with veteran suicide. Learn more at nm5actions.com.

## AS OF SEPTEMBER 30, 2025 THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT IS ELIMINATING PAPER CHECKS

 Do you receive monthly checks from Social Security? Do you receive your yearly Tax Refund by check? Do you receive Veterans Benefits by check?

You will need a bank account for direct deposit or apply for an exception (very limited) with the U.S. Treasury as soon as possible.

Do you make payments to the IRS or federal government by check?

You will now need to make those payments electronically.

#### **Property Tax Exemptions**

The New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services (NMDVS) is accepting applications for the Veterans property tax exemptions signed into law on March 20, 2025. The standard Veteran property tax exemption increased to \$10,000 and will be applied to the Veteran/unmarried surviving spouse's notice of value. In 2026 and subsequent tax years, the amount shall be adjusted for inflation.

For tax year 2026, the Disabled Veterans Exemption allows for the Veteran/unmarried surviving spouse to apply for an adjusted exemption in an amount equal to the percentage of the Veteran's disability as determined by federal law. Veterans who choose to add the new Disabled Veteran tax exemption must submit an application to NMDVS and file it with their County Assessor.

#### Documents needed to verify eligibility:

- A copy of DD-214, NA 13038, NOAA Form 56-16, or PHS Form 1867
- VA Award Letter showing percentage of disability
- NM Driver's License, ID, Voter registration card, or most recent NM Personal Income Tax Return
- Widow/Widower copy of marriage and death certificates

#### **New Mexico State Park Lifetime Veterans Pass**

The New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services (NMDVS) is accepting applications for the New Mexico State Park Lifetime Veterans Pass. This pass gives eligible Veterans free, unlimited access to all New Mexico state parks, including day-use and overnight camping. Standard entry and campsite fees are waived, but reservation processing charges, group shelters, special event sites, and cabin rentals are not included.

The program is a partnership between NMDVS and the State Parks Division under the Energy, Minerals, and Natural Resources Department (EMNRD). To qualify, applicants must be New Mexico residents with honorable or general (under honorable conditions) service in the U.S. Armed Forces, including the National Guard, Reserves, U.S. Public Health Service, or NOAA Corps.

#### **Applicants must submit:**

- A completed application form
- Proof of service DD-214, NOAA Form 56-16, or PHS Form 1867
- Proof of New Mexico residency (driver's license, voter registration, or state tax return)

Approved Veterans will receive a non-transferable vehicle hang-tag pass that must be displayed in the park.

**Please note:** Due to high demand, processing times may be longer than usual. Our team is working diligently to ensure every submission is handled as quickly and accurately as possible.

Due to the growing demand for benefits and services, NMDVS has updated its walk-in service schedule for September.

Beginning in September, DVS Field Offices will designate specific walk-in days for veterans seeking assistance with VA claims and State Benefits.

#### On these designated days, veterans can be seen without an appointment for full services.

Services remain available every weekday; however, veterans visiting field offices on non-designated walk-in days without scheduled appointments may experience limited services or long wait times but can opt to drop off applications for benefits.

NMDVS State Benefits Offices\*\* will continue to offer full service to daily walk-ins, with no change in availability.

Veterans seeking state-specific benefits may visit these offices at any time during regular business hours.

#### **Upcoming DVS Veterans' Benefits Outreach Visits**

NMDVS is scheduled to make the following outreach visits at the locations listed below. Veterans and/or their eligible dependents are encouraged to stop by to file for or ask information about—VA disability ratings, VA medical or mental health care, retiree pensions, military burials, and many other VA benefits.

Staff can also help with applying for state Veterans' benefits such as discounted fishing and hunting licenses, Veterans' license plates, property tax exemptions, state park passes, and many more state Veterans' benefits.

Please bring a copy of your DD 214, NA 13038, NOAA 56-16, PHS 1867, Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty, which are necessary for filing all Veterans' benefits claims. VA award letter showing percentage of disability, NM Driver's License, ID, voter Registration card, and Widow/Widower copy of marriage and death certificates if applicable. NMDVS can help Veterans file for lost or misplaced DD 214s.

#### 78th Birthday of the U.S. Air Force and Air National Guard

#### Forgotten Heroes Burial Ceremony 2025

On Thursday, September 18, 2025, the cremated remains of 38 unclaimed military Veterans will be laid to rest with full military honors during the annual Forgotten Heroes Burial Ceremony. The memorial service will begin at 9 a.m. at Legacy Church, located at 4701 Wyoming Blvd NE, Albuquerque. Following the ceremony, the urns will be escorted by law enforcement, service agencies, and the New Mexico American Legion Riders. The ceremony concludes at 11 a.m. at the Santa Fe National Cemetery, 501 North Guadalupe Street.



The Forgotten Heroes Funeral Program is a partnership between the New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services, Bernalillo County, the New Mexico National Guard, Albuquerque Police Department, Santa Fe Police Department, Bernalillo County Sheriff's and Fire Departments, Director's Choice Funeral Home, and Santa Fe National Cemetery. The program ensures that honorably discharged Veterans who pass away without family or friends to claim them receive a proper burial with the dignity and respect they deserve.

The public is invited to attend and serve as "family" to provide a final salute for these fallen Veterans who have served our country. This event demonstrates that respect for military service has no expiration date.



#### **POW MIA Recognition Day September 19th**

On Friday, September 19th, our state and nation will observe National POW/MIA Recognition Day. For many Veterans, this day is not just another date on the calendar; it is a time to remember brothers and sisters in arms who never came home and to honor those who endured captivity with courage and dignity.

In New Mexico, this remembrance carries a special weight. The 200th Coast Artillery, our "New Mexico Brigade", stood among the first to face combat in World War II. Many of those Soldiers were forced into the infamous Bataan Death March. Their sacrifice is etched into our state's history and their resilience continues to inspire generations of service members. Across New Mexico, memorials like the Bataan Memorial Park in Albuquerque and the Bataan Memorial Building in Santa Fe, keep their stories alive for all who served and continue to serve.

For Veterans, the black and white POW/MIA flag holds deep meaning. The stark image of the prisoner's silhouette reminds us of our comrades who were left behind and of the promise we made never to forget them. Flying that flag is not just a tradition, it's a bond of loyalty to those who cannot stand beside us.

On this day, Veterans across our state will gather at military bases, memorials, and community events. Some will attend flag ceremonies or stand watch at a missing man table. Others will share stories with their families or quietly raise the POW/MIA flag at home. However we choose to honor this day, we do it with respect, remembrance, and the promise that no one is forgotten.

For every Veteran, POW/MIA Recognition Day is a chance to reflect on the bonds of service. It is a moment to honor the sacrifices of our brothers and sisters and to renew our commitment to those still missing. Here in New Mexico, where military history runs deep, that commitment endures. This September 19th, let us remember, honor, and stand united because we know what it means when we say: You are not forgotten.

The Bataan Building in Santa Fe serves as the headquarters of the New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services. Named in honor of the New Mexicans who endured the Bataan Death March during World War II, the building stands as both a working government office and a tribute to sacrifice. The building was added to the National Register of Historic Places and is home to military displays and New Mexico's Eternal Flame.







#### Gold Star Mother's and Families Day September 28th

Observed on the last Sunday in September, Gold Star Mother's Day, falls on September 28th this year. It is a deeply meaningful day set aside to recognize and honor mothers who have lost a son or daughter in military service, as well as the families who continue to bear that loss.

The phrase "Gold Star" dates to World War I, when families would display flags in their windows to represent loved ones serving in the armed forces: a blue star for each active service member, and a gold star placed over the blue to signify a life lost in service to the nation. This enduring symbol reminds us of the price of freedom and the sacrifices made not only by those who serve but also by the families who support them.

Founded in 1928, American Gold Star Mothers, Inc. has carried forward this tradition of remembrance, providing comfort, community, and advocacy to ensure the stories and sacrifices of fallen service members are never forgotten. The New Mexico Garden Clubs, Inc., part of the National Garden Clubs program, has also played a vital role in honoring Veterans and Gold Star families. Their Blue Star program honors Veterans past, present, and future, while the Gold Star program offers honor, hope, and healing for families of the fallen.

It has been a very busy year with the Blue and Gold in New Mexico, marked by meaningful dedication ceremonies across the state: June 12th, the Artesia Garden Club and City of Artesia dedicated a Blue Star and Gold Star Marker at 511 W. Texas Avenue. Troop 228 presented the colors in a moving ceremony, and Mayor Pro Tem Jeffrey Youtsey signed a proclamation declaring the day as Blue Star, Gold Star Family Day.

On June 26, 2025, in Roswell, the Home Garden Club dedicated a Gold Star Marker at the General Douglas McBride Cemetery, 3101 South Main Street. Mayor Tim Jennings accepted the marker on behalf of the city. Garden Club members presented a beautiful wreath, and the New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services (NMDVS) Cabinet Secretary Jamison Herrera dedicated the marker on behalf of the National Garden Clubs, Gold Star Families, and Gold Star Mothers. NMDVS Director of Veteran State Benefits Edward Mendez delivered the Gold Star Families' tribute. Earlier events this year also included dedications in Albuquerque, Clovis, and Angel Fire. Additional markers are planned for Albuquerque later this fall, as well as future dedications in Hobbs.

As we observe Gold Star Mother's and Families Day on September 28th, New Mexico honors the families whose lives have been forever changed by loss. Through the work of the Garden Clubs and the Gold Star Monuments across our state, we ensure that the service and sacrifice of our Veterans and their families will never be forgotten.

#### Two 100 Year Old WWII Veterans Honored

The New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services (NMDVS) honored two World War II Veterans before they threw out the first pitch at Isotopes Park on Sunday, August 24th. Lawrence Talamante and Ted Rush, both celebrating their 100th birthdays, were recognized by Lieutenant Governor Howie Morales and NMDVS Cabinet Secretary Jamison Herrera.

Ted Rush was born in Chicago in 1925 and, in 1943, answered his call to duty by joining the United States Marine Corps, performing as a musician with the Halls of Montezuma Orchestra, and trained in Guadalcanal. He landed with the 4th wave of the invasion at Yontan Airfield, serving as a stretcher bearer during the Battle of Okinawa, Mr. Rush met war correspondent Ernie Pyle on his first day in Okinawa; a moment that later came full circle when he went on to teach at Ernie Pyle Junior High School in Albuquerque. His connection between wartime experiences and his years as an educator in New Mexico reflects a lifetime of service both in uniform and in the classroom.

Lawrence Talamante, born in Gallup, NM, in March 1925, left high school in 1943 to answer his call to duty by joining the United States Navy, beginning a journey serving with the Seabees and sailing on the USS Pine Island and the William Mitchell during WWII to serving as a field kitchen cook and on the Fleet Air rescue mission in the Korean War in 1950. His continued service in the Naval Reserve after returning from the Navy highlighted his dedication and willingness to serve others. Mr. Talamante was a culinary specialist within his community and at the Ft. Wingate Army Depot near Gallup, NM.

We honor not only their service and sacrifice, but also the courage of an entire generation who answered the call during World War II. As the number of living WWII Veterans grows smaller each year, it is more important than ever to preserve their legacy and ensure their resilience continues to inspire

#### **NMDVS Agency & Veteran Service Officer Training**

From August 11th to 15th, the New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services (NMDVS), in partnership with the National Association of County Veterans Service Officers (NACVSO) and the New Mexico Indian Affairs Department (NMIAD), hosted an in-person accreditation training in Albuquerque. This intensive, week-long program brought together Tribal Veteran Service Officers (VSOs) and NMDVS staff to strengthen their knowledge of Veterans' benefits and build the skills needed to advocate for Veterans and their families effectively.

Seven Tribal VSOs and three NMDVS VSOs earned their national accreditation upon completion of the course. This accreditation grants these officers the ability to directly represent Veterans before the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). With this authority, they can ensure Veterans in their communities receive professional, informed, and timely assistance in navigating the complex VA benefits system. The training also fostered the exchange of cultural perspectives and best practices, strengthening the partnership among Tribal Nations, Pueblos, Tribes, the State of New Mexico, and NMIAD in serving Veterans.

By hosting this training locally, NMDVS, NACVSO, and NMIAD demonstrated their commitment to making accreditation more accessible to VSOs serving in rural and Tribal communities. As a result, more Veterans across New Mexico, particularly in sovereign Tribal nations, will have access to accredited representatives dedicated to helping them secure the benefits they have earned through their service.

NMDVS also held its annual All Agency Training Event on August 15th in Albuquerque, bringing together staff from every corner of the state, providing employees with the opportunity to step away from their daily routines and connect with colleagues who share the same mission, serving New Mexico's Veterans and their families.

Over the course of the training, staff participated in workshops and were encouraged to collaborate across divisions. More than just a series of presentations, the event served as a forum for exchanging ideas, discussing challenges, and learning best practices from one another.

For many employees, the training was also a chance to put faces to the names they work with every day over the phone and email. 

#### Alamogordo Honors 100 Year Old Marine Fred Ballek

The New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services (NMDVS) joined the community of Alamogordo on Saturday, August 30th, to honor World War II Veteran Major Fred Ballek, who marked his 100th birthday on August 21st.

The Yellow Jackets of Otero County, an organization that supports the Veterans of Honor Flight of Southern New Mexico, hosted the celebration. Members of the Marine Corps League, American Legion, and other Veteran organizations gathered to recognize Major Ballek's century of life and distinguished record of service.

NMDVS Cabinet Secretary Jamison Herrera presented Major Ballek with a plaque and a formal letter of appreciation, acknowledging both his service in the United States Marine Corps and his extraordinary milestone.

Born in East Haddam, Connecticut, in 1925, Major Ballek grew up during the Great Depression, a time of profound change and challenge in American history. In 1942, as the world was engulfed in war, he answered the nation's call by enlisting in the United States Marine Corps. He went on to serve with the Marine night fighter squadrons in Okinawa during World War II. After that, he was deployed to Vietnam. Major Ballek also served the solemn duty as a Casualty Assistance Calls Officer, responsible for notifying families of fallen service members, providing support during times of loss, and ensuring they received the benefits and honors owed to their loved ones.

Following his career in the Marine Corps, Major Ballek continued his commitment to service as a member of the Coast Guard Auxiliary. His devotion to Veterans and the community endures through his lifetime memberships in the Veterans of Foreign Wars, American Legion, Marine Corps League, and numerous other organizations dedicated to supporting those who have served.

On behalf of NMDVS and the people of New Mexico, we extend our deepest gratitude to Major Fred Ballek for his service, sacrifice, and enduring legacy. We honor his century of life, his devotion to country, and wish him a most heartfelt 100th birthday.

#### **Local Collaborative 18**

On Saturday, August 23rd, the New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services (NMDVS) participated in the Local Collaborative 18 (LC18) Veterans and Families Event at Northern New Mexico College in Española.

The event was hosted in partnership with the Eight Northern Indian Pueblos Council, Inc. (ENIPC), a nonprofit consortium representing the tribal governments of Nambe, Picuris, Pojoaque, San Ildefonso, Ohkay Owingeh, Santa Clara, Taos, and Tesuque. ENIPC works to strengthen the well-being of these Pueblo communities through collaboration with tribal, state, and federal governments, focusing on education, healthcare, and economic development.

Activities included behavioral health workshops, wellness therapies, and traditional dances. NMDVS Cabinet Secretary Jamison Herrera recognized the service of all Veterans present, while Tribal Liaison Beverly Charley emphasized the importance of collaboration and mutual support. Krista Luna, NMDVS Healthcare Division Director, presented information on rural transportation, care coordination, and homeless programs, and met one-on-one with Veterans to coordinate future services, referrals, resources, and answer questions. Angelica Lapahie, Suicide Prevention Coordinator, provided an overview of suicide prevention services and assisted Veterans with questions about suicide prevention efforts.

The NMDVS Tribal Liaison Program plays a vital role in fostering collaboration across all Tribal communities in New Mexico. Serving as the primary point of contact for Native American Veteran concerns, the Tribal Liaison ensures ongoing communication and partnership.

#### **Veterans' Memorial Walkway Brick Installation Ceremony**

On the morning of Saturday, August 30th, volunteers, staff, and community members came together to lay 512 bricks along the Veterans Memorial Walkway at the Angel Fire Vietnam Veterans Memorial, including eight special bricks honoring Medal of Honor recipients, creating a lasting tribute to Veterans and active military personnel.

The annual event, hosted by the David Westphall Foundation in partnership with the New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services (NMDVS), provides a meaningful opportunity to honor those who have served. Since 2007, Run for the Wall (RFTW) riders have generously contributed their labor and support, helping to make each ceremony a heartfelt tribute.

The New Mexico National Guard 615th Transportation Battalion provided additional assistance, alongside American Legion Post 12 and other Veteran organizations, further strengthening the sense of community and shared purpose.

The day began with an opening ceremony led by Westphall Foundation president Jay Mitchell, followed by a warm welcome from NMDVS Deputy Cabinet Secretary Eric James. In a moving moment, Deputy Secretary James presented Vietnam Veteran Gilbert Padilla of the U.S. Army with a challenge coin in recognition of his service, and Padilla's family placed his engraved brick in the walkway, a symbol of honor and remembrance.

Each brick carries a story: some memorialize those who made the ultimate sacrifice, while others celebrate Veterans who returned home and lived full lives. Together, they form a mosaic of service, courage, and memory; a solemn yet healing cornerstone of the Angel Fire Memorial.

Managed by NMDVS in collaboration with the Westphall Foundation, the Memorial offers more than just the Walkway. Visitors can explore the museum, library, and visitor center, gaining insight into the daily lives and sacrifices of military personnel. A half-scale replica of the National Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall bears the names of over 58,318 fallen service members, including 400 New Mexicans, connecting local heroes to the national story of Vietnam Veterans. The Memorial also overlooks the Angel Fire State Veterans Cemetery, which opened in July 2020.

The Angel Fire Vietnam Veterans Memorial stands as a powerful reminder of service, sacrifice, and community; where every brick tells a story and every visit honors the legacy of those who served.



## News from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA)

#### SCOUTS Program brings care to Veteran's homes in New Mexico

In New Mexico, one-third of the population lives in a rural area. Older New Mexican Veterans often need to travel long distances to receive needed services. However, innovations at <u>VA New Mexico Health Care System</u> have changed how hundreds of Veterans receive their care. <u>Supporting Community Outpatient, Urgent care & Telehealth Services (SCOUTS)</u> is a program that sends Intermediate Care Technicians (ICTs) to the homes of older or medically complex Veterans who have recently left the Emergency Department (ED) to provide follow-up care.



SCOUTS addresses health concerns before they can worsen while a Veteran waits for their next scheduled appointment at a VA Medical Center. This cuts down on wait times by providing faster care.

ICTs typically conduct a home visit between 48 and 72 hours after a Veteran has been discharged from the ED. ICTs check for situations where Veterans might require more assistance. They check for situations like a lack of internet access, geriatric syndromes such as dementia or malnutrition, and if the Veteran is having difficulty moving throughout their home. ICTs then facilitate a telehealth visit with the Veteran and a VA provider to check for risks that might lead to a repeat visit to the ED.

"Medicine is coming full circle now," said Albuquerque VA ICT Michael Anguti. "Home visits through ICTs are the future of care. Our ICTs coordinate with a provider, PT [physical therapy], OT [occupational therapy], to prevent falls, help Veterans move around the house, identify problems, and address them. We keep Veterans on the radar and bring them in when need be."

#### **Connecting Veterans with care early**

John Romero, an ICT who drives up to 12 hours a week for Veteran home visits, emphasized the preventative care benefits SCOUTS offers. "We are the ER plus," he said. "We go to the houses to provide wound care, draw blood, screen them with some questions to see if they need any additional services to make them less likely to return to ER."

The SCOUTS team also works to prevent first-time ED visits by providing proactive support. Gregory Sanford, another ICT on the Albuquerque team, explained how their team will call Veterans over the phone who are 75 years or older and have not been to a VA ED, to see if they have any unmet needs. By conducting these screenings, they can help Veterans stay out of the ED.

"Veterans feel they're worth somebody's time and are cared for in between appointments. There's mutual respect and appreciation," said Romero.

SCOUTS now operates out of 10 VA sites nationwide, and it will continue to diffuse across the country to other sites. To learn more about SCOUTS, visit its webpage on <u>Diffusion Marketplace</u>.

## Veterans Crisis Line Fact Sheet



#### Confidential crisis help for Veterans and their families

The Veterans Crisis Line is a toll-free, confidential resource that connects Veterans in crisis and their families and friends with qualified, caring U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) responders.

Veterans and their loved ones can **Dial 988 then Press 1**, chat online at **VeteransCrisisLine.net/Chat**, or send a text message to **838255** to receive free, confidential support 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year, even if they are not registered with VA or enrolled in VA health care.

The responders at the Veterans Crisis Line are specially trained and experienced in helping Veterans of all ages and circumstances—from Veterans coping with mental health issues that were never addressed to recent Veterans struggling with relationships or the transition back to civilian life. Veterans Crisis Line responders provide support when these and other issues—such as chronic pain, anxiety, depression, sleeplessness, anger, and even homelessness—reach a crisis point. Some of the responders are Veterans themselves and understand what Veterans and their families and friends have been through.

Since its launch in 2007, the Veterans Crisis Line has answered more than 6.2 million calls and initiated the dispatch of

emergency services to callers in crisis more than 233,000 times. The Veterans Crisis Line anonymous online chat service, added in 2009, has engaged in more than 739,000 chats. In November 2011, the Veterans Crisis Line introduced a text-messaging service to provide another way for Veterans to connect with confidential, round-the-clock support and since then has responded to more than 253,000 texts.

In 2011, the National Veterans Suicide Prevention Hotline was renamed the Veterans Crisis Line to encourage Veterans and their families and friends, who may be the first to realize a Veteran is in emotional distress, to reach out for support when issues reach a crisis point, even if it is not a suicidal crisis.

As of July 16, 2022, Veterans and their loved ones in the U.S. can Dial 988 then Press 1 to reach the Veterans Crisis Line.

VA is working to make sure that all Veterans and their loved ones are aware of the Veterans Crisis Line. To reach as many Veterans as possible, VA is coordinating with communities and partner groups nationwide, including community-based organizations, Veterans Service Organizations, and local health care providers, to let Veterans and their loved ones know that support is available whenever, if ever, they need it.

You never know when a crisis may happen. There are simple steps you can take to be prepared. Find instructions below to save the new Veterans Crisis Line number—Dial 988 then Press 1—as a contact in your iOS or Android phone.

- Navigate to the Phone app.
- Tap the "Contacts" button at the bottom, and then tap the "+" button in the top-right corner to add a new contact.
- Name the contact Veterans Crisis Line.
- Tap the "add phone" button.
- Type 988 on the keypad, then tap "+\*#" in the lower left corner of the keypad.
- Tap the "pause" button on the keypad and then type 1.
- Tap the "Done" button in the top-right corner to save the contact.
- 8 When you use this contact, your phone will automatically route you to the Veterans Crisis Line.

#### ANDROID

- Navigate to the Contacts app.
- Use the "+" to add a contact.
- 3 Name the contact Veterans Crisis Line.
- 4 Type 988 in the phone number input.
- 5 Add a pause and then type 1. Adding a pause may appear differently on different phones. Options include:
  - Typing in a comma
  - . Clicking on a pause button directly on the phone number input (this may be displayed as "two-second pause")
  - Opening a menu by clicking three vertical dots to find the pause button
- 6 Click "Save" to save your contact.
- When you use this contact, your phone will automatically route you to the Veterans Crisis Line.

#### Veterans Affairs Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers

Eligibility Criteria Fact Sheet



The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers (PCAFC) offers enhanced clinical support for Family Caregivers of eligible Veterans.





#### Veteran Eligibility Requirements:

A Veteran or Service member may be eligible for a Family Caregiver if all of the following requirements are met:

- 1 The individual is either:
  - · A Veteran; or
  - A member of the Armed Forces undergoing a medical discharge from the Armed Forces.
- 2 The individual has a serious injury (including serious illness) incurred or aggravated in the line of duty in the active military, naval, or air service.
  - For purposes of PCAFC, serious injury means any service-connected disability that: (1) Is rated at 70 percent
    or more by VA; or (2) Is combined with any other service-connected disability or disabilities, and a combined
    rating of 70 percent or more is assigned by VA.
- 3 The individual is in need of in-person personal care services for a minimum of six (6) continuous months based on any one of the following:
  - · An inability to perform an activity of daily living;
  - A need for supervision or protection based on symptoms or residuals of neurological or other impairment or injury; or
  - A need for regular or extensive instruction or supervision without which the ability of the Veteran to function in daily life would be seriously impaired.
- 4 It is in the best interest of the individual to participate in the program.
- Personal care services that would be provided by the Family Caregiver will not be simultaneously and regularly provided by or through another individual or entity.
- 6 The individual receives care at home or will do so if VA designates a Family Caregiver.
- The individual receives ongoing care from a Primary Care Team or will do so if VA designates a Family Caregiver.






