New Mexico Commemorates Veterans' Day

The New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services (NMDVS) will commemorate Veterans' Day through ceremonies and events across the state.

NMDVS Cabinet Secretary Jamison Herrera will serve as the keynote speaker at the Santa Fe Veterans' Day Ceremony, held at the Santa Fe Convention Center on Tuesday, November 11, from 10:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. The Santa Fe Concert Band and members of the Santa Fe Symphony Chorus will perform patriotic music in observance of Veterans Day.

The Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Angel Fire will host its annual Veterans' Day Ceremony at 11:00 a.m. Native New Mexican and Vietnam War Veteran Jerry Martinez will deliver the keynote address, and the Cimarron High School Band will provide music during the event, which will take place inside the museum at the memorial.

NMDVS Deputy Cabinet Secretary Eric James will attend the Albuquerque Veterans' Day Ceremony on November 11. The event begins at 10:30 a.m. at the New Mexico Veterans Memorial. The Dukes of Albuquerque Concert Band will perform, and a flyover courtesy of the New Mexico Chili Flight is scheduled.

Its origins date back to the end of World War I, when an armistice between the Allied nations and Germany took effect on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month in 1918. One year later, the United States marked November 11 as Armistice Day to recognize World War I Veterans.

Following World War II and the Korean War, it became clear that the nation owed gratitude to Veterans of every generation. In 1954, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed legislation renaming the federal holiday Veterans' Day and expanding its purpose to honor all American Veterans, past, present, and future. NMDVS Services Uninterrupted

While the federal government continues its shutdown, the New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services (NMDVS) remains fully open and committed to serving Veterans and their families across the state. As a state agency, NMDVS operates independently from the federal government and is not affected by the shutdown. Every NMDVS office is continuing normal operations, ensuring that Veterans can still receive the help they need to access both state and federal benefits.

NMDVS Veteran Service Officers (VSOs) are available statewide to assist Veterans with filing and tracking VA claims, gathering necessary documentation, and answering questions about how the shutdown may affect their benefits. Even though the VA's Albuquerque Regional Office is currently closed to the public, claims processing continues, and NMDVS VSOs are ready to help Veterans navigate any temporary disruptions or confusion that may arise.

In addition to federal benefits assistance, NMDVS continues to help Veterans and eligible family members access valuable state programs. These include property tax exemptions, Lifetime Veterans Park Passes, educational scholarships, reduced-fee hunting and fishing licenses, and specialty license plates. NMDVS is also a trusted point of contact for connecting Veterans with other state and community resources that support housing, education, employment, and well-being.

Now more than ever, NMDVS wants Veterans to know they are not alone. Whether you need help filing a claim, understanding your benefits, or accessing state programs, our staff is here to guide and support you. Upcoming DVS Veterans' Benefits Outreach Visits

NMDVS is scheduled to make the following outreach visits at the locations listed below. Veterans and/or their eligible dependents are encouraged to stop by to file for or ask information about—VA disability ratings, VA medical or mental health care, retiree pensions, military burials, and other VA benefits.

Staff can also help with applying for state Veterans' benefits such as discounted fishing and hunting licenses, Veterans' license plates, property tax exemptions, state park passes, and many more state Veterans' benefits.

Please bring a copy of your DD 214, NA 13038, NOAA 56-16, PHS 1867, Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty, which are necessary for filing all Veterans' benefits claims. VA award letter showing percentage of disability, NM Driver's License, ID, voter Registration card, and Widow/Widower copy of marriage and death

NM Dept of Veterans' Services & Bernalillo County Assessor's office representatives will be on site to assist eligible veterans and unmarried widows applying for:

- * \$10,000 Standard Veterans Property Tax Exemption.
- * Percentage Based Disabled Veterans Property Tax Exemption.
- * Disabled Veterans Permanent & Total property Tax Waiver.

The following documents will be required to verify Property Tax certificate eligibility:

- 1. A copy of your DD-214, NA 13038, NOAA form 56-16, or PHS form 1867
 - * DD214 must be full form, unredacted and include character of service
 - * Visit www.archives.gov to request discharge paperwork if needed.
- 2. If applicable, VA Federal Award letter verifying service-connected disability rating
 - * If you do not have a copy of your current VA Award letter, a free copy can be obtained by establishing an account at www.va.gov or by calling 1-800-827-1000.
- 3. Proof of New Mexico Residency Includes one of the following documents:

Valid NM Driver's license / Current voters registration card / Most recent NM income tax return

Property Tax Exemptions and Lifetime Veteran Park Passes

The New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services (NMDVS) State Benefits Division is accepting applications for the Veterans property tax exemptions and the NM State Park Lifetime Veterans Pass.

1. Property Tax Exemptions:

The standard Veteran property tax exemption is now \$10,000 and will adjust annually for inflation beginning in 2026. Additionally, the Disabled Veteran Exemption allows eligible Veterans or their unmarried surviving spouses to apply for a tax exemption equal to the Veteran's federal disability rating. Applications must be submitted to NMDVS and filed with your County Assessor.



2. New Mexico State Park Lifetime Veterans Pass:

Eligible New Mexico Veterans can apply for a free lifetime pass providing unlimited access to all state parks, including day-use and overnight camping. Standard entry and camping fees are waived; however, reservation and special facility fees still apply.

Documents needed to verify eligibility for the benefits

- A copy of DD-214, NA 13038, NOAA Form 56-16, or PHS Form 1867 Proof of New Mexico residency (driver's license, voter registration, or state tax return)
- VA Award Letter showing percentage of disability (only for tax exemption)
- Widow/Widower copy of marriage and death certificates (only for tax exemption)

Army Veteran Placido Borrego Honored On His 101st Birthday



New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services (NMDVS) Cabinet Secretary Jamison Herrera joined family and friends at Bonanza Creek Ranch in La Cienega on October 6 to celebrate U.S. Army Veteran Placido Borrego's 101st birthday. Secretary Herrera presented Mr. Borrego with a commemorative plaque recognizing this remarkable milestone, along with his extraordinary service, lifelong dedication to New Mexico and the nation.

Drafted in 1943 at age 19, Mr. Borrego served as an Artillery Gunner with the U.S. Army's 65th Infantry Division during World War II. He fought bravely in France and, after being wounded in combat, returned to the fight until his honorable discharge in 1946.

After returning home to Española, he married his beloved wife of 63 years, Delfina Calles y Borrego. He continued his service with the Army Reserves, being called to active duty during the Korean War, where he trained troops until his discharge in 1951. He later joined the New Mexico National Guard, where he served through the Vietnam War era, earning the Victory and Good Conduct Medals. Mr. Borrego was also called to duty during the 1980 New Mexico State Penitentiary riot, exemplifying his lifelong courage and commitment.

After more than 40 years of military service, Mr. Borrego retired from the New Mexico National Guard in 1984, leaving a lasting legacy of sacrifice, leadership, and devotion.

"Mr. Borrego's life reflects the true spirit of service and resilience that defines our Veterans," said Secretary Herrera. "It was an honor to celebrate this incredible milestone with him and his family."

NMDVS & Navy League Join to Honor 101 Year Old Navy Veteran

On October 18, 2025, representatives from NMDVS attended the New Mexico Navy Ball, presented by the Navy League of New Mexico Council and the Navy Reserve Center Albuquerque. NMDVS Deputy Cabinet Secretary Eric James and Director of State Benefits Edward Mendez presented U.S. Navy Veteran Raymond Bonda with a New Mexico state flag that had been flown over the Capitol in his honor. David Williams, CDR USN (Ret.), President of the NM Council of the Navy League, also presented Mr. Bonda with a Centennial plaque in celebration of his recent 101st birthday.



Mr. Bonda enlisted in the U.S. Navy shortly after graduating from high school in 1943. His journey to boot camp took him through Albuquerque, a city he would later call home, where he worked for the Bureau of Indian Affairs and Indian Health Service until his retirement in 1984. During World War II, Mr. Bonda served aboard the USS Gardiners Bay (AVP-39), a seaplane tender, where he repaired battle-damaged aircraft throughout the Pacific.

After World War II, he continued his service in the Naval Reserve and was called back to active duty during the Korean War in 1950. Assigned to the Air Wing aboard the USS Princeton (CV-37), where he again repaired damaged aircraft, including the Navy's early jet fighter, the F9F Panther.

Mr. Bonda's wife, Carole, shared that, "he feels like a rock star, with all the recognition he has received for his service and longevity." Everyone in attendance wholeheartedly agreed. NMDVS extends its gratitude to the Navy League for including the department in honoring Mr. Bonda, and to Mr. Bonda himself for his dedicated service and sacrifices to the State of New Mexico and our nation.

Stand Down Events Across The State

"Stand Down" is a military term that originated during wartime, referring to periods when weary combat troops were withdrawn from the front lines and moved to secure locations to rest and recover.

Stand Down events today support and advocate for homeless and low-income Veterans. These events provide essential supplies and services, including food, shelter, clothing, health screenings, and benefits counseling. The New Mexico Department of Veterans Services (NMDVS) proudly supports Stand Down events across the state.

NMDVS staff attended the Veterans Wellness Conference - Stand Down/ Hand Up Project hosted by the City of Gallup at the Red Rock Park Convention Center in Church Rock, NM, on October 3, 2025. This free, in-person event featured presentations and a resource fair focused on Veterans and their needs in the community.

On Friday, October 10, 2025, the annual San Juan County Stand Down was a tremendous success, delivering critical services and support to local individuals experiencing homelessness, including Veterans. Participants received hot meals, haircuts, showers, dental care, and access to a wide range of community resources. NMDVS was honored to collaborate with San Juan College Veterans Center and American Legion Post 93.

On October 17, 2025, the Veterans Integration Center hosted its Stand Down at The Rock at Noon Day in Albuquerque. NMDVS Cabinet Secretary Jamison Herrera opened the event, bringing together organizations and volunteers committed to honoring the service and sacrifices of Veterans while connecting homeless and at-risk Veterans with vital services and benefits.

In Las Cruces, on October 24, 2025, NMDVS staff and volunteers joined together for a day dedicated to serving homeless and near-homeless Veterans with the respect and dignity they deserve.

NMDVS extends sincere gratitude to all volunteers, partners, and organizations who came together to support and uplift Veterans and others experiencing homelessness in communities across New Mexico.

















Park Renamed to Honor WWII Woman Veteran

The City of Albuquerque renamed High Desert Park to Dorothy Jensen Blanchard-High Desert Park yesterday, October 30, 2025, as part of the ABQ Stories of Us initiative to honor an extraordinary World War II veteran whose legacy of service and leadership helped open doors and break down barriers for generations of women in the military.

New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services (NMDVS) leadership attended the event, with Cabinet Secretary Jamison Herrera speaking along with Mayor Tim Keller and other city of Albuquerque representatives. Dorthy's daughter, Linda Blanchard, and her husband, Bomi Parakh, also thanked everyone for their support in the effort to rename the park.

Dorothy Jensen Blanchard proudly served in the U.S. Navy from 1943 to 1952 as a member of the Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service (WAVES). Rising to the rank of Yeoman Chief Petty Officer, she played a vital role supporting naval operations during and after World War II, including assignments at the Merchant Shipping Office, working at the highest levels in the Pentagon. During her service, Blanchard witnessed key moments in American history, including the signing of the National Security Act of 1947. This led to the creation of the U.S. Air Force and the establishment of Kirtland Air Force Base in Albuquerque the following year.

Her distinguished career shaped national defense policy and paved the way for greater inclusion of women in the armed forces. She received the "Living Legend Award" in 2023 from the Military Women's Memorial in Arlington, Virginia, for her extraordinary military contributions and lifetime of civic engagement. This legacy continues to inspire women in uniform today.

"She set a path for women and all service members to follow," said NMDVS Cabinet Secretary Jaimison Herrera. "Let's not mark today as a singular day celebrating her 101 years of life; she was constantly praising, pushing, and being a patriot."

Later in life, Blanchard made Albuquerque her home, living in the High Desert area from 2000 until her passing in 2024 at the age of 101.

NMDVS supports the Military Women's Memorial Strive for 500 Campaign, a nationwide effort to honor the legacy of women in uniform like Dorothy Jensen Blanchard by preserving their stories. We need you to represent New Mexico, as each state is challenged to register at least 500 women Veterans. For more than 30 years, the Military Women's Memorial has collected names, photos, service records, and personal experiences of women who answered the call to serve.

Topic of Month:

Being as November celebrates Veterans' Day, let's touch on the question of "why women who have served in the military do not consider themselves a Veteran?" How do we expect society to recognize us if we don't identify ourselves?

Answer:

There are many reasons for these perceptions but let's break it down.

For decades, the word "Veteran" was often linked to men who fought in combat. Because women were historically excluded from those roles, many still question whether their service "counts." Too often, women Veterans are overlooked — mistaken for spouses, underrepresented in history, and even unseen within Veteran spaces.

Many women downplay their service, viewing it as simply "doing their job," while others distance themselves from the label due to experiences of gender bias or harassment. This invisibility, combined with limited outreach, means some women still don't realize they fully qualify for VA and state Veteran benefits — regardless of combat or deployment status.

As proud **New Mexico Women Veterans**, we will change that narrative. We stand together, lift each other up, and proudly say: "I am a Veteran. I served."

Last month, Jeff and his team faced the task of clearing a large backlog of service requests. Jeff didn't just lead from behind a desk. He rolled up his sleeves and worked shoulder-to-shoulder with his staff and other departments, answering messages, solving problems, and setting the tone for a culture of accountability and service. His "can-do" attitude and willingness to jump into the trenches inspired his team to push through the volume and stay committed to the agency's mission.

I decided to make a career change and applied. I was unaware of NMDVS's existence. During the interview, I explained how I had filed for disability on my own, along with the appeal ordeal I went through to receive a 10% rating.

I promised that if I received the Veteran Service Officer training, no Veteran receiving my assistance would be as confused about the process as I was. It's been a great journey guiding Veterans through the complicated VA system to receive all the benefits to which they are entitled.

How long have you been with the agency?

I started as a VSO with NMDVS in March 2008, and was promoted to Bureau Chief, State Benefits Division on January 20, 2020.

What do you enjoy most about your work with NMDVS?

The ability to assist clients in receiving the benefits they have earned and receiving the heartfelt gratitude of a Veteran or widow that I have helped.

What is your connection to the Veteran community?

My father was a Marine Corps Veteran and served in Vietnam. I served in the Army from 1993 to 1996 as an M1A1 Armor Crewman. I am a member of the American Legion in Santa Fe, the DAV in San Juan County, and the VFW in Los Alamos.

My hobbies include hiking, snowshoeing, and billiards. I am the captain of eight and nine-ball teams in the Santa Fe American Poolplayers Association.

VA Announces Cemetery Grants for Angel Fire and Fort Stanton

The Department of Veterans Affairs' National Cemetery Administration (NCA) announced that it has awarded two significant grants to the State of New Mexico to enhance its Veterans cemeteries. A grant of up to \$1,325,135 has been allocated for the expansion of the Fort Stanton State Veterans Cemetery, and a grant of up to \$5,993,108 has been awarded for the expansion of the Angel Fire State Veterans Cemetery.

Fort Stanton State Veterans Cemetery, located in south-central New Mexico, provides a final resting place for more than 12,000 Veterans and their eligible family members in the region. Established to honor the service of New Mexico's Veterans, the cemetery has become an important site for memorial services and community remembrance. The awarded grant will fund the development of 202 in-ground cremation gravesites, as well as improvements to roadways, landscaping, and irrigation systems, ensuring a dignified and accessible environment for visitors.

Angel Fire State Veterans Cemetery, nestled in the scenic northern mountains of New Mexico, serves over 18,000 Veterans and their eligible family members. Known for its serene natural setting and panoramic views, the cemetery provides a peaceful and solemn space for commemorating the lives of those who served. The grant will support the construction of an administration building, a maintenance building and yard, a committal service shelter, and 144 in-ground cremation gravesites. Additional improvements will include landscaping and irrigation, enhancing both functionality and the overall aesthetic of the grounds.

These expansions demonstrate New Mexico's commitment to honoring its Veterans and ensuring that they and their families have access to well-maintained, respectful cemeteries for generations to come.

The New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services (NMDVS) operates three State Veterans Cemeteries dedicated to honoring the service and sacrifice of New Mexico's Veterans and their eligible family members. Located in Fort Stanton, Gallup, and Angel Fire, these cemeteries provide a dignified resting place for those who served our nation. Each site reflects the state's deep respect and gratitude for its veterans, offering beautifully maintained grounds, military honors, and perpetual care.

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) estimates 97 percent of VA employees continue to work during a shutdown, according to the VA Human Capital Contingency Plan. VA is committed to provide quality, consistent care and services to Veterans, families, Caregivers, and Survivors. VA's mission allows no exception to this standard even when operations are limited by the absence of appropriations (commonly known as a "Government shutdown").



SERVICES TO VETERANS NOT IMPACTED:



VA Medical Centers, Outpatient Clinics, and Vet Centers will be open as usual and providing all



VA benefits will continue to be processed and delivered, including compensation, pension, education, and housing benefits.



Burials will continue at VA national cemeteries. Applications for headstones, markers, and burial benefits processing will continue.



The Board of Veterans' Appeals will continue decisions on Veterans' cases.



Call Centers: VA's primary call center (1-800-MyVA411) and the Veterans Crisis Line (Dial 988, Press 1) will remain open 24/7. The VA Benefit Hotline (1-800-827-1000) will be available Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. ET.

The event also includes the Pledge of Allegiance, reflections on Veterans Day, recognition of dignitaries, and closing remarks and prayers.


