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Armed Forces 250th Anniversary

This year, our country commemorates the 250th Anniversary of the United States Armed Forces, with three of the nation's original military branches celebrating this milestone together: the United States Army, the United States Navy, and the United States Marine Corps. Established in 1775 during the earliest days of the American Revolution, these branches formed the foundation of the modern military and set in motion a tradition of service that continues today.

Over time, the Armed Forces expanded to include the United States Coast Guard, the United States Air Force, and the United States Space Force. Together, these six branches form the military structure that defends our nation across land, sea, air, space, and cyberspace. Their combined missions reflect a commitment to protecting the United States for two and a half centuries.

As we honor this historic anniversary, we recognize the generations of service members who answered the call. Soldiers, Sailors, Marines, Airmen, Guardians, and Coast Guardsmen have stood watch in times of peace and conflict. They have protected American interests worldwide, supported allies, responded to disasters, and served communities here at home. Their dedication reflects the enduring values of honor, integrity, and resilience that define our nation.

Here in New Mexico, we also take pride in a unique point. The New Mexico National Guard traces its lineage back to Spanish colonial militias formed in 1598, making it older than the United States itself and one of the oldest military organizations in the country. For centuries, New Mexicans have stepped forward to defend their homeland and support the missions of the Armed Forces with distinction and courage.

The New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services honors the many New Mexicans who have contributed to this legacy. Our state's Veterans have served in every branch, in every conflict, and in every era of American history. Their service, sacrifice, and continued leadership strengthen communities across the Land of Enchantment long after their time in uniform.

As we celebrate the 250th Anniversary of the United States Armed Forces, we extend our heartfelt gratitude to all Veterans and their families who support them. Your courage shaped our history. Your service protected our nation. Your example continues to inspire future generations who choose to serve.

Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day

December 7th is National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day, a day of reflection honoring the 2,403 service members and civilians who lost their lives during the 1941 attack on Pearl Harbor. In less than two hours on that quiet Sunday morning, the Imperial Japanese Navy launched the surprise attack that crippled the United States Pacific Fleet and destroyed 188 American aircraft. Eight battleships and three cruisers were destroyed or heavily damaged. The USS Arizona and USS Utah were sunk, taking with them hundreds of Navy sailors and Marines; more than 900 aboard the USS Arizona were never recovered. Today, the USS Arizona Memorial stands above the ship's resting place, honoring those who remain forever entombed within.

Naval History records describe how the USS Arizona erupted in a massive explosion after being hit by Japanese bombers, igniting fires that burned for more than two days. Across the harbor, chaos and heroism unfolded as service members fought fires, rescued the wounded, and defended their ships against overwhelming force.

The attack began around 7:55 a.m. and within hours, Japan carried out coordinated strikes on American and British bases across the Pacific, including the Philippines, Guam, Wake Island, Midway, and Hong Kong. The next day, President Franklin D. Roosevelt addressed the nation, calling December 7th, "a date which will live in infamy", and asking Congress to declare war. The United States' entry into World War II would call upon extraordinary courage and sacrifice from what would come to be known as the Greatest Generation.

New Mexico National Guard units were among the first to answer the call, including the 200th Coast Artillery, which had been federalized just months before the attack. Many of these soldiers would soon be deployed to the Philippines, fighting to defend Bataan and Corregidor and enduring some of the war's most difficult chapters. Across the state, from the pueblos and ranching communities to cities and towns, New Mexicans stepped into vital roles. Communities rallied behind the war effort through bond drives, rationing, and volunteer service.

National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day ensures that the events of that morning, and the service of all who responded, are never forgotten. The New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services honors Veterans who survived, families who lost loved ones, and the legacy that New Mexicans have proudly upheld for generations.











National Guard Birthday

On December 13th, the nation celebrates the United States National Guard's birthday. As the oldest branch of the United States Armed Forces, the National Guard has stood ready since 1636 to defend the nation and support communities in times of need. In New Mexico, that legacy stretches even further, tracing its proud history back to the colonial militias of Spanish Nuevo México in 1598.

Early territorial militias, known as the New Mexico Volunteers, fought bravely in the Civil War, playing a decisive role in the Battle of Glorieta, and serving with Teddy Roosevelt's Rough Riders. Their service laid the foundation for the modern New Mexico National Guard.

New Mexicans have served in every major conflict in United States history. During World War II, the 200th and 515th Coast Artillery Regiments defended the Philippines with extraordinary courage, and the 804th Tank Destroyer Battalion served with distinction and honor in Europe.

At home, the New Mexico National Guard continues to answer the call during state emergencies, responding to wildfires, floods, and other disasters to protect communities across the state.

As we mark the National Guard's birthday, the New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services honors the Guard members who currently serve or have previously served, as well as the families who support them, and all who continue this proud tradition of readiness and duty.







United States Space Force Birthday

December 20th marks the birthday of the United States Space Force, the newest branch of the United States Armed Forces, and the first military service established in more than 70 years. Created in 2019, the Space Force is charged with organizing, training, and equipping Guardians to protect America's interests in space, an operational domain that has become vital to national security, global communication, and daily life worldwide.

Since its establishment, the Space Force has undertaken missions including satellite operations, missile warning, global positioning systems, space surveillance, and the protection of critical space-based technologies. Guardians support joint operations across every branch of the military, ensuring our nation maintains a secure and resilient presence in space.

New Mexico continues to play a meaningful role in America's space mission. With a long history of aerospace innovation, military testing, and national laboratory research, the state remains a hub for space exploration and defense. Many New Mexico Veterans, civilians, and families have contributed to advancing the capabilities that make Space Force operations possible today.

As we recognize the Space Force's birthday, the New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services honors every Guardian, past, present, and future, whose expertise and dedication safeguard our nation in this evolving frontier. Their service strengthens our country's ability to meet new challenges and ensures the United States remains a leader in space for generations to come.

Upcoming DVS Veterans' Benefits Outreach Visits

NMDVS is scheduled to make the following outreach visits at the locations listed below. Veterans and/or their eligible dependents are encouraged to stop by to file for or ask information about—VA disability ratings, VA medical or mental health care, retiree pensions, military burials, and other VA benefits.

Staff can also help with applying for state Veterans' benefits such as discounted fishing and hunting licenses, Veterans' license plates, property tax exemptions, state park passes, and many more state Veterans' benefits.

Please bring a copy of your DD-214, NA 13038, NOAA 56-16, PHS 1867, Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty, which are necessary for filing all Veterans' benefits claims. VA award letter showing percentage of disability, NM Driver's License, ID, voter Registration card, and Widow/Widower copy of marriage and death certificates if applicable. NMDVS can help Veterans file for lost or misplaced DD 214s.

Forgotten Heroes Honored at Fort Stanton State Veterans Cemetery

The unclaimed remains of nine Veterans were laid to rest on Wednesday, November 19th, at Fort Stanton State Veterans Cemetery. More than 200 community members, Veterans, and supporters gathered to stand in place of family and offer a final salute to those who served our nation.

The New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services (NMDVS), in collaboration with the Scenic Chapel Funeral Home in Alamogordo, ensured these Veterans and one military spouse were interred with full honors. Stephen McConnell, Interment Supervisor at Fort Stanton State Veterans Cemetery, and his staff worked closely with area communities to organize and support this solemn ceremony. The service featured an Army Honor Guard from Fort Bliss and an Air Force Honor Guard from Holloman AFB. Pastor Alan Ward of Saddle Creek Cowboy Church delivered the eulogy, offering a heartfelt tribute to their lives and service.

Reflecting on the community's response, NMDVS Director of Benefits Ed Mendez shared, "The turnout for the Forgotten Heroes Ceremony at Fort Stanton was tremendous. Our southern New Mexico community stepped forward, ensuring these Veterans received the dignity and recognition they earned through their service".

Property Tax Exemptions and Lifetime Veteran Park Passes

The New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services (NMDVS) State Benefits Division is accepting applications for the Veterans property tax exemptions and the NM State Park Lifetime Veterans Pass.

1. Property Tax Exemptions:

The standard Veteran property tax exemption is now \$10,000 and will adjust annually for inflation beginning in 2026. Additionally, the Disabled Veteran Exemption allows eligible Veterans or their unmarried surviving spouses to apply for a tax exemption equal to the Veteran's federal disability rating. Applications must be submitted to NMDVS and filed with your County Assessor.



2. New Mexico State Park Lifetime Veterans Pass:

Eligible New Mexico Veterans can apply for a free lifetime pass providing unlimited access to all state parks, including day-use and overnight camping. Standard entry and camping fees are waived; however, reservation and special facility fees still apply.

Documents needed to verify eligibility for the benefits

- A copy of DD-214, NA 13038, NOAA Form 56-16, or PHS Form 1867
 Proof of New Mexico residency (driver's license, voter registration, or state tax return)
- VA Award Letter showing percentage of disability (only for tax exemption)
- Widow/Widower copy of marriage and death certificates (only for tax exemption)

Burial Flag Honors Presented to State Representatives

Debra Sariñana with the flag she accepted as next of kin during the 2025 Forgotten Heroes Ceremony held in September. Later that afternoon, Secretary Herrera also presented Rep. Alan Martinez with the flag he received as next of kin at a Veterans Services Event held at the Sandoval County Government Complex.

Both representatives received these flags in recognition of their participation in the annual Forgotten Heroes Burial Ceremony, which honors and lays to rest the unclaimed cremains of Veterans across New Mexico.



Fisher House: Supporting Veterans and Families

The Albuquerque Fisher House provides free, temporary lodging for families of Veterans and active-duty service members receiving care at the Raymond G. Murphy VA Medical Center. Its mission is simple: to ensure no Veteran goes through illness or recovery without the support of loved ones.

The home offers comfortable rooms, shared kitchens, and welcoming gathering spaces where families can rest, connect, and find comfort during difficult times.





Leading this effort is Fisher House Manager Carlos Velasquez, whose dedication comes from nearly two decades

of service in the U.S. Army and National Guard. After being medically retired in 2016, he continued his career with the VA in roles such as Veteran Services Representative, Field Examiner, and Supervisory Budget Analyst. His commitment to helping Veterans brought him to the Fisher House, where he ensures every family feels supported the moment they arrive. Carlos notes that since opening in December 2019, the Albuquerque Fisher House has served 1,318 families and 1,934 individual guests, saving Veterans an estimated \$870,000 in lodging and food expenses.

What Is a Veteran Service Officer and How Can We Assist You?



A Veteran Service Officer (VSO) is a state-accredited professional who is legally authorized to assist Veterans, service members, and their families in obtaining the benefits they have earned through military service. Under Title 38 of the Code of Federal Regulations (38 CFR), specifically 38 CFR \$14.628, VSOs are recognized by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) as accredited representatives trained to prepare, present, and prosecute claims for VA benefits. In New Mexico, the Department of Veterans' Services (NMDVS) employs VSOs across the state who serve as advocates, not as employees of the federal VA, ensuring Veterans receive every possible benefit available under federal, state, and local programs.

VSOs provide one-on-one assistance with all aspects of a Veteran's claim, from gathering military service records and medical documentation to submitting formal applications for disability compensation, pensions, education benefits, survivor benefits, and VA healthcare applications. They are skilled in interpreting VA laws, regulations, and evidence requirements, helping Veterans avoid costly delays or denials. Under 38 CFR §3.103, Veterans are entitled to representation in any claim, and NMDVS ensures that this right is exercised through free, professional, and confidential advocacy. Beyond federal benefits, VSOs also connect clients to New Mexico state programs, including property tax exemptions, educational scholarships for dependents, and burial benefits at the State Veterans Cemetery.

To prepare for an appointment with a VSO, Veterans and family members should bring key documents such as:

- DD-214 or other discharge papers
- Marriage and birth certificates (for dependents)
- Any medical evidence related to claimed conditions
- A list of current medications

Private medical records, and records of in-service events or exposures can also strengthen a claim. VSOs help Veterans assemble this documentation into a comprehensive submission, ensuring the VA has all the necessary evidence to make an accurate, timely decision.

NMDVS is proud to stand beside every Veteran, spouse, and survivor as they navigate the complex world of VA benefits. Whether you are filing your first claim, appealing a denial, or seeking survivor assistance, our VSOs are here to advocate for you. Veterans Day Across New Mexico

The New Mexico Department of Veterans' Services (NMDVS) took part in Veterans Day commemorations across the state, joining communities in honoring the service and sacrifice of New Mexico's Veterans.

In Santa Fe, the annual Veterans Day ceremony was held at the Santa Fe Community Convention Center. It featured patriotic performances by the Santa Fe Concert Band and the Santa Fe Symphony Chorus. NMDVS Cabinet Secretary Jamison Herrera delivered the Governor's proclamation and the keynote address, reflecting on the history and significance of Veterans Day.

In Albuquerque, celebrations began with a parade from USS Bullhead Memorial Park to the New Mexico Veterans Memorial Park. The event included live music from the Dukes of Albuquerque Concert Band, a flyover by the New Mexico Chile Flight, and remarks from NMDVS Deputy Secretary Eric James, who also delivered the proclamation. On November 8th, NMDVS staff participated in a tribute at Historic Fairview Cemetery to honor all Veterans and those laid to rest there. The ceremony featured live music and a wreath-laying tribute.

At the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Angel Fire, attendees gathered inside the memorial's museum for the annual ceremony. Native New Mexican and Marine Corps Vietnam Veteran Jerry Martinez delivered a powerful keynote address, and the Cimarron High School Band performed in tribute to all who have served.

Sierra Vista Hospital in Truth or Consequences honored Veterans both in the community and receiving care at the hospital with a Hall of Honor Ceremony and Challenge Coin presentation. NMDVS Veteran Service Officer and Central Region Manager Rob Miller addressed fellow Veterans and guests, speaking about the enduring importance of service.

The Ojo Encino Veterans Organization hosted a commemorative Veterans Day celebration and parade on November 14th to honor military service members and Veterans within the community. The event, held at the Ojo Encino Day School Gymnasium, brought together ceremonial traditions, student involvement, and community recognition for local Veterans. NMDVS Deputy Secretary Eric James attended as a guest speaker, offering remarks in support of the community and its Veterans.

Navajo Nation Veterans Appreciation and Recognition Day

The Navajo Nation Veterans Affairs Department hosted a Veterans Appreciation and Recognition Day on November 3rd at Navajo Technical University in Crownpoint, bringing together Veterans, families, tribal leaders, and community members to honor the service and sacrifice of Native Veterans.

A highlight of the event was the signing of a proclamation declaring the Navajo Nation a Purple Heart Nation. Purple Heart recipient Ned Mitchell was among those recognized for their courage and dedication. Navajo Nation President Dr. Buu Nygren, Executive Director Bobbie Ann Baldwin, and representatives from the Military Order of the Purple Heart led the ceremony, reaffirming the Nation's commitment to honoring wounded warriors.

Gilbert Yazzie, Commander of the Breadsprings Chapter Veterans Organization, helped recognize local Veterans, while NMDVS Tribal Liaison Beverly Charley provided information on state benefits and programs.

The NMDVS Tribal Liaison Program plays a vital role in fostering collaboration across all Tribal communities in New Mexico. Serving as the primary point of contact for Native American Veteran concerns, the Tribal Liaison ensures ongoing communication and partnership.

On November 12th, the New Mexico Gold Star Mothers, in partnership with New Mexico Garden Clubs, Inc., and the High Desert Design Club, hosted a Gold Star Memorial Marker Dedication Ceremony at the Albuquerque Garden Center, located at 10120 Lomas Blvd NE.

The ceremony honored the families of fallen service members who have made the ultimate sacrifice in defense of our nation. The Gold Star tradition, which began during World War I, continues to symbolize the profound loss endured by families who lost loved ones in service to freedom. Since 1928, American Gold Star Mothers, Inc. has carried this tradition forward, offering comfort, community, and advocacy so that the stories of the fallen are never forgotten.

On December 22, 1944, during the Battle of the Bulge, Lt. Reba Z. Whittle became the only American military woman held as a POW in the European Theater during World War II.

Topic of the Month:

For many women Veterans, December brings a mix of celebration, reflection, and, at times, stress. The holidays can be joyful, but they can also feel overwhelming, especially when balancing family expectations, finances, memories of service, or the emotional weight that often surfaces at this time of year. If this season feels heavier than usual, you are not alone.

<u>Women who served carry unique responsibilities and experiences</u>, and it's important to remember that your wellbeing matters, this month and every month. Here's a few things to remember during this time:

<u>You're allowed to slow down</u>- The holiday schedule can pull you in every direction. Give yourself permission to set boundaries, say no when you need to, and prioritize rest. A calmer season starts with recognizing your own needs.

Recognize and honor your feelings- The holidays can stir up memories—some comforting, some difficult. Many women Veterans report this time of year as a trigger for anxiety, grief, or loneliness. Your feelings are valid. Take breaks when needed, reach out for support, and give yourself grace. Strength is asking for help when you need it.

<u>Check in with your support system</u>- Whether it's family, a trusted friend, another woman Veteran, or a support group, connection is a protective factor. A five-minute call can ease stress and remind you that you're surrounded by others who understand your journey.

<u>Self-care Tips</u>: Small daily habits can make a big difference: A quiet morning walk, deep breathing or mindfulness, writing down three things you're grateful for, staying hydrated and eating consistently (easy to forget during busy times!) These simple acts help steady the mind and support emotional regulation.

*This season, remember: you've served, you've sacrificed, and you deserve grace and support.

NMDVS Veteran Transportation Programs

The Highly Rural Transportation program offers Veteran transportation to and from VA-authorized medical appointments through programs funded by both VA and the state. Veterans can schedule free round-trip, non-emergency, medical transportation to VA-authorized appointments and VA-approved non-VA healthcare providers.

Highly Rural Transportation Program (HRTP):

The Highly Rural Veteran Transportation Program (HRTP) is funded through the Highly Rural Transportation Grant (HRTG) provided by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. The program focuses on providing transportation services in 15 designated "Highly Rural" counties: Catron, Cibola, Colfax, De Baca, Guadalupe, Harding, Hildalgo, Lincoln, Mora, Quay, San Miguel, Sierra, Socorro, Torrance, and Union

Services are available to any areas within Native or Tribal Lands.

Statewide Veterans Transportation Program (SVTP):

Funded by the New Mexico Legislature, this program expands service to the remaining 18 counties not covered under HRTP. Like HRTP, it provides Veterans with safe, no-cost transportation to VA, specialty, and approved community care facilities in the following counties:

Bernalillo, Chaves, Curry, Doña Ana, Eddy, Grant, Lea, Los Alamos, Luna, McKinley, Otero, Rio Arriba, Roosevelt, San Juan, Sandoval, Santa Fe, Taos, Valencia

NMDVS administers both programs in coordination with transportation providers across the state. Veterans can schedule rides by calling **505-429-5906**. A copy of the Veteran's VA ID card or a driver's license/state ID with the "Veteran" designation is required. All appointments must be authorized by the VA. Please allow at least three days' advance notice to schedule transportation.

News from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA)

New Scam Targeting Veterans: VA Benefits Overpayment

Clever scammers are targeting Veterans, surviving spouses, and family members who receive VA benefits. They pretend to be official VA representatives and use official communication channels to demand repayment for alleged benefits overpayments. Fraudulent letters, emails, and texts often include fake VA letterheads and logos, making it difficult to distinguish genuine VA communications from scams.



Common tactics used by scammers

- Fake VA letterheads and logos: Scammers often use fake VA letterheads, logos and even spoofed phone numbers to make their communication appear authentic.
- Claims of overpayment: Scammers claim you have been overpaid on your VA benefits and now owe money back to the VA.
- Pressure tactics: Scammers may pressure you into making immediate payments directly to them instead of through official VA payment channels. Requests for sensitive information: Scammers may ask for sensitive information, such as your VA login credentials, password or financial information.

If you receive a letter or any communication about a VA benefits overpayment, log into your official <u>VA.gov account</u> immediately to verify if you truly owe money. The VA website will provide clear information on whether you owe any money. If you find you do owe money, VA's Debt Management Center (DMC) offers many <u>repayment options</u>.

How to protect yourself

- Verify the authenticity of the letter: If you receive a letter or communication about a VA benefits overpayment, log into your official VA.gov account immediately to verify if you truly owe money.
- Only use official VA channels: If you find you do owe VA money, resolve the debt directly using VA.gov or by calling VA's Debt Management Center (DMC) at 1-800-827-0648.
- Never share login information: VA will never ask for your login credentials or passwords.
- Be cautious of unsolicited contact: Be wary of unsolicited emails or texts asking for personal details or directing you to external websites that are not part of <u>VA.gov</u>.
- Do not pay upfront fees: If someone demands an upfront payment to help with your VA debt or claims, it's a scam.
- Avoid clicking on unknown or suspicious messages: Be cautious if you receive an email or text asking for your personal information.

Never share sensitive information: Never share sensitive information, such as social security numbers, bank account details or credit card information when responding to unsolicited requests.

How to report VA overpayment scams

• Contact VA: If you have been the target of a scam or suspect of fraudulent activity, contact VA immediately at 1-800-827-1000.

Veterans who suspect they have experienced fraud can find out more and report to the appropriate agency <u>online</u> at VSAFE.gov or calling (833) 38V-SAFE.
